WHY A HOUSE?

A strong house is built from the ground up. If the foundation is weak, the rest of the house becomes unstable. Parenting works the same way.

Many parents focus first on rules, consequences, and discipline. While those are important, they work best when they rest on a foundation of love, connection, and acceptance.

**Rules without relationship often lead to resistance.
Relationship gives rules their influence.**

THE 6 A'S OF PARENTING

Foundation: Unconditional Love & Acceptance

Walls: Availability • Affection • Appreciation • Affirmation

Roof: Accountability (with Authority & Boundaries supporting it)

FOUNDATION

Unconditional Love & Acceptance

Children need to know:

- I am loved.
- I belong.
- I matter.
- My mistakes do not determine my worth.

Acceptance does not mean approving of every behavior.

It means: "I can dislike your behavior while still loving and valuing you."

When children feel secure in a parent's love, they are more willing to accept guidance, correction, and accountability.

THE WALLS – RELATIONSHIP BUILDERS

1. AVAILABILITY

I make time for you.

- Put down the phone.
- Listen without immediately fixing.
- Spend one-on-one time together.
- Enter their world and interests.

Ask yourself: Does my child feel like a priority? Do they have regular access to me?

3. APPRECIATION

I notice what you do.

- "Thank you for helping."
- "I noticed how hard you worked."
- "I appreciate your honesty."

Appreciation teaches:

- Contribution
- Responsibility
- Gratitude

Ask yourself: Am I noticing more than I am correcting?

2. AFFECTION

I enjoy you and care about you.

- Hugs
- Smiles
- Physical affection
- Kind words
- Shared laughter

Ask yourself: Does my child regularly experience warmth from me?

4. AFFIRMATION

I see who you are becoming.

- "You are kind."
- "You are resilient."
- "I admire your courage."
- "I trust your character."

Affirmation helps children develop:

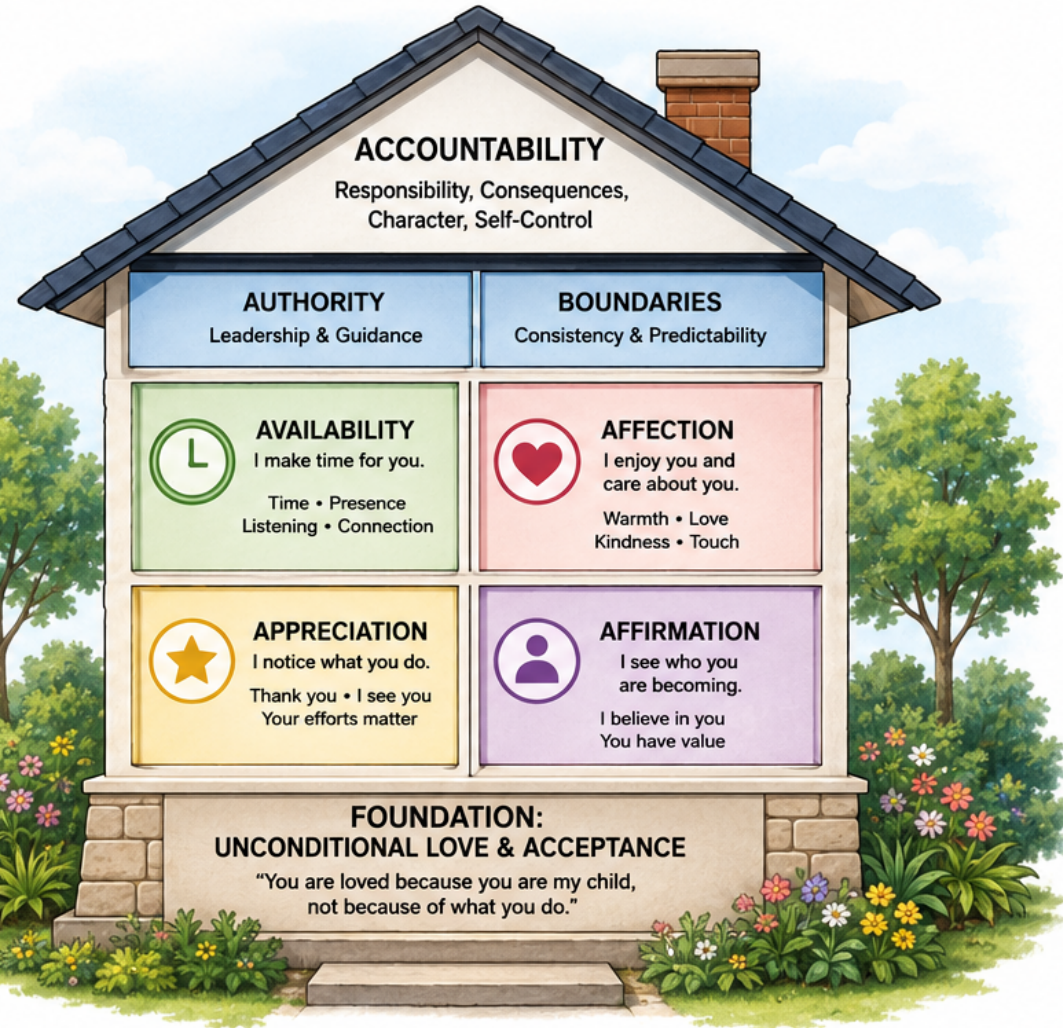
- Confidence
- Security
- Healthy identity

Ask yourself: What positive qualities am I calling out in my child?

ACCOUNTABILITY (THE ROOF)

Responsibility, Consequences, Character, Self-Control

Accountability protects and strengthens the house. Children need expectations, limits, consequences, responsibility, and follow-through.

5. AUTHORITY

Leadership & Guidance

Parents are the leaders. Children need our guidance, wisdom, and direction.

6. BOUNDARIES

Consistency & Predictability

Clear limits and expectations create safety. Children thrive in homes where rules are calm, consistent, and fair.

 Ask: "How can this situation help my child learn and grow?"
